#### **Executive Summary**

Hello OVAG Community,

In 2021 we have had to hold our annual workshop once again in a virtual setting – and I have to say, we are getting very good at this! #### OVAG strategy into the future: WE NEED YOUR HELP.

Back in 2017 we went through this process together. Just like risk analysis this is an iterative process, and what we did in 2017 was designed to take us to 2022. Who would have thought we are there again!

**SO, WE NEED YOUR HELP** - both to make sure OVAG is focused on the participants - so YOU guys, and to allow us to evaluate our impact and prove to supporters that we are 'doin' good'.

Where are we now? Theory of change involves backward mapping, so in 2017 we started with a 20-year impact statement. This is like an organizations vision in that it is aspirational, but should also be achievable in collaboration with others:

Successful integration of One Health programmes into conservation efforts leading to successful disease mitigation in wild populations and linked public health and environmental disease issues with a proven contribution to the protection of SE Asian wildlife, habitat and human health that can be used as a model for other regions

We then all decided on a phase outcome (2017 - 2022). This is like an organizations mission; in that it should be achievable and measurable for impact:

There exists a sustainable regional cadre of professionals able to provide capacity building, advice, guidance, and management of One Health matters with wildlife in Indonesia and Malaysia

We then looked at pathways to make that phase outcome a reality. In 2017 these were:

Capacity building

**Policy** 

Research

Advocacy

These were expanded on, and linked to assumptions made and indicators into our full ToC pathway map (available on the canvas page) then flowed to guide us to this outcome

#### **OVAG 2021 Workshop Analysis:**


In total 139 people registered for the OVAG 2021 Virtual Workshop (daily attendance varied).




Total Number of Attending Participants: 114










New Ideas: Did I gain new ideas that will improve the way I do my job? 49 responses




New Knowledge: Did I gain useful knowledge?


# Applying the learning: Will I use the information?


Effect on results: Do I think the ideas and information provided at this workshop will improve the way I do my job?


Applying the learning: Have I been shown how to impart this knowledge to colleagues and managers?
